

# College Planning Timeline

# **Freshmen:**

#### <u>Fall</u>

- o Map out the classes you'll need to take for the next four years in preparation for college admissions. Take the most challenging course of study possible.
- o Join clubs and activities that interest you.
- Start building positive relationships with teachers, counselors, and activity supervisors, so that you can obtain recommendations for college later.
- o Select a volunteer organization in which you'd like to be involved.
- Become familiar with the Standardized Tests you will need to take (i.e. OGT, ACT/SAT)

#### **Spring**

- o Begin to discuss college costs with parents/guardians.
- o Apply for summer jobs and volunteer opportunities.

# **Sophomores:**

### <u>Fall</u>

- o Take the most challenging course of study possible.
- o Look for leadership roles in clubs and activities.
- Start thinking about college choices (i.e. in-state vs. out-of-state, close to home vs. far from home, private vs. public, etc.).
- o Continue to strengthen relationships with teachers, counselors, and activity supervisors.
- o Continue to review Standardized Tests that will be required for graduation and admittance into college.
- o Take the PLAN and/or PSAT when it is offered at your high school.

## **Spring**

- o Continue discussing college costs with parents/guardians.
- o Investigate financial aid options and procedures.
- o Apply for summer jobs and volunteer opportunities.

# **Juniors:**

#### Fall

- o Take the most challenging course of study possible.
- o Research prospective colleges and potential courses of study.
- o Attend college fairs.
- o Begin studying for the ACT/SAT.
- o Look for scholarship opportunities.
- o Take leadership roles in clubs, activities, and volunteer organizations.
- o Begin to consider which teachers, advisors, counselors, or employers you might ask for letters of recommendation.
- o Explore financial aid options with your parents/guardians.

#### **Spring**

- o Apply for all available scholarships for juniors.
- o Research your course of study, and find the colleges that offer that major.
- o Visit prospective colleges during spring break.
- Sign up to take the ACT and/or SAT. GHS CODE 362-285
- Create your resume, including academic record, extracurricular activities, and volunteer work.
- o Continue discussion of college costs with parents/guardians.
- o Apply for summer jobs and volunteer opportunities.

#### <u>Summer</u>

- Visit prospective colleges.
- o Athletes should register with the NCAA Initial Eligibility Clearinghouse at <a href="https://www.eligibilitycenter.org">www.eligibilitycenter.org</a>
- o Request applications and brochures from your top colleges.
- Take time to prepare for the ACT and/or SAT.

# **Seniors:**

## Fall

- Take the ACT visit <u>www.actstudent.org</u> GHS code is 362 285
- o Take the most challenging course of study possible.
- Narrow down your list of potential colleges.
- Request applications and brochures from your target colleges. Make copies of your application and complete a "rough draft" prior to filling out the actual application.
- o Make copies of the applications before you send them. Keep them in order, and be sure to meet all deadlines.
- Schedule college visits.
- Request letters of recommendation from teachers, counselors, advisors, and employers.
- o Research scholarship opportunities, and apply for as many as possible.
- o Visit www.finaid.org to learn more about financial aid.

- o Start gathering materials needed to complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid), which is available on January 1<sup>st</sup> of your senior year. Submit all tax information early to maximize the aid you receive.
- o Check with your prospective colleges about additional financial aid application requirements.

#### **Spring**

- o Review college acceptance letters and financial aid packages.
- Compare your admissions offers. Make a decision that is going to be most beneficial to you in the future.
- o Make your final decision as to which college you plan on attending, and notify, in writing, the schools you have decided not to attend.
- o Pursue student loan options if needed.
- o Notify your college of any private scholarships you have earned.
- Notify the guidance office of the college you will be attending, and request that a final transcript be sent.

#### **Summer**

- o Double-check any final deadlines for housing, financial aid, etc.
- o Apply for a summer job and volunteer activities.
- o Set up a projected first-year college budget.
- O Prepare for your future as an adult!
